From the Pastors

With many visiting family over Fall Break, Thanksgiving, and Christmas, I thought it would be a good time to think about *those* conversations, the ones you dread having with family members: morality discussions. You start talking about the weather, and the next thing you know you're bringing up the 10 commandments, and they're saying, "I don't care. I don't agree!" These conversations can quickly become heated! If this kind of conversation sounds familiar, then before you blow your top, take a deep breath and recognize that it's not that they don't know God's law; they don't accept it. Surprise! There's no biblical basis for their morality.

If you find yourself in this *increasingly common* situation over the next couple months, first, ask yourself, "Do I have a biblical basis for what *I'm* saying?" If your answer is, "Yes, the Bible says so," then be prepared to tell them where. If you know where to find that passage, its context, and its interpretation, then congratulations! You're probably part of the solution, not the problem. But if your answer is, "It's in there somewhere, I'm sure of it," then you might just be part of the problem. Your worldview is probably more cultural or political or logical or emotional or even more religious than it is biblical. This is an uncomfortable and confrontational thing for me to say, but it's important for all Christians to realize that a biblical worldview and biblical morality can only emerge in our lives one way: from reading and knowing and living the Bible. There are no shortcuts, and when it comes to biblical morality, we all have work to do. And knowing is only half the battle if we want to communicate our Bible knowledge to others.

So back to our friends and family members. Note that if they don't value the commands of God, then even saying, "The Bible says so," is not going to change their mind (obviously, neither is telling them how wrong they are!). They'll simply deflect, because they don't care what the Bible says. Maybe they'll say, "but your commandments don't sound loving." Or maybe they'll respond, "Sure, it might be nice as an ideal, but that expectation isn't practical for the real world." Or maybe they will say, "The Bible is a flawed document written by flawed people. Why would we obey those flawed human commandments?" Or maybe they will simply say, "Well, the Bible is wrong." The devil has many ways to lead us astray.

Whatever the case, arguing with someone who doesn't value God's law about God's law is like trying to solve the symptoms of disease, without curing the underlying disease first. If we want to change their mind on any subject of morality, we have to first change their heart's relationship to God. After all, this is what we confess when we recite the small catechism. The first commandment means "We should fear, love, and trust God above all things," and every other commandment starts with, "We should fear and love God such that we..." All morality flows from the 1st Commandment. Every commandment assumes the fear and love of God. When they fear and love God above all else, then we can meaningfully discuss divorce or homosexuality or abortion or anything else... But until that time, arguing morality is wasting your breath on the wrong conversations.

So what should we start with instead? Consider starting with the love of God, or forgiveness, or the goodness of God. Talk about the parables of Jesus and their interpretation. None of these conversations are easy, but they may just invigorate your own Bible reading. If we're to be winsome in these conversations, we need to know the Bible ourselves. We need our own biblical morality and biblical worldview.

Stewardship Update By Jake Allen, Stewardship Ministry Team Director

Calvary Endowment Funds Update – Church Endowment Fund

Over the next few months the Stewardship Ministry Team will present an update on each of Calvary's three endowment funds: 1) The Church Endowment Fund; 2) The Schwark Endowment Fund; and 3) The Wessler Endowment Fund. Each of these funds serve a distinct purpose in our Ministry. This month we will discuss the status of Calvary's largest fund – the Church Endowment Fund. The market value of this fund is \$887,027 (August 31, 2021).

Earnings from the Church Endowment Fund are used to help fund new and expanding ministries. Each year the church receives 5% of the fund balance for expanding ministries. This year the endowment fund contributed \$ 38,036 to support the Facilities Manager and the Video and Digital Media Ministry.

Since its inception in 1987, the endowment fund has provided additional support for Youth and Education Ministry, Music Ministry, Business Manager, Ministry of Assimilation, Admissions Director, Technology support, our Deaconess, our Facilities Manager and our new Video and Digital Media Ministry.

Contributions to any of the endowment fund may be made at any time by designating "Calvary Church Endowment Fund" and the specific fund on your contribution envelope or your on-line contributions as well. Also, when preparing your will or beneficiaries to your retirement accounts, prayerfully consider designating a tithe to the Church or Synod. Funds can be designated to a specific purpose, given to the general fund or given to one of Calvary's Endowment Fund.

Mission Update from the Fiorello's

Chris and Alie Fiorello, Calvary's Wycliffe missionaries to West Asia, are in a time of transition. The political situation in the country where they serve has become too unstable for them to live and work there during this time. For now, they are working remotely from the US as they seek the Lord about how to best serve the Bibleless peoples of West Asia. Please pray for patience and discernment during this season.

Because of this temporary relocation and the higher costs of living in the US, they are experiencing a large budget shortfall. Reduce Your State Taxes – Please Consider a Gift to the Lutheran Scholarship Granting Organization (SGO) This is a reminder that gifts to the Scholarship Granting Organization may be eligible for a 50% credit on your Indiana State Income Taxes. There may be federal tax benefits as well. Details can

<u>Status of Calvary SGO giving year to date:</u> Thanks to everyone who has already made a gift to the SGO for the benefit of Calvary. As of early September, approximately \$50,000 has been donated to provide scholarship dollars to Calvary students. More funds are still needed to get to our target of \$113,000 by year end. Please be aware that the tax credits that the State of Indiana has set aside are limited and many other schools are also utilizing these funds. Therefore, it is important to consider making your gift sooner than later before the pool of available tax credits is all used up.

God has opened the doors to families who would not have considered Christian education opportunities within their financial abilities. How are these doors being opened?

Scholarship Grant Organization Program [SGO]

Private and corporate funded mechanisms are in place providing tuition scholarships to qualified families. All students are eligible for these scholarship grants. The same household income levels are used for the Indiana vouchers and the scholarship tax credit program. Calvary Lutheran Church and School has established our own Scholarship Tax Credit fund through The Lutheran SGO of Indiana, Inc.

Why should I consider donating to the Scholarship Grant fund?

Benefit #1: Each year Calvary Lutheran Church and School provided over \$30,000.00 in scholarship money to families unable to pay the entire tuition costs. Donating to the SGO fund has eliminated these budgeted scholarships.

Benefit #2: All of your donated money comes right back to Calvary Lutheran Church and School.

Benefit #3: Students granted an SGO scholarship in 2021 will have it converted to an CHOICE Scholarship Indiana voucher for the 2022/23 school year.

Benefit #4: 50% of your corporate or private donation is an Indiana state tax CREDIT. If your state tax liability is less than your CREDIT, that CREDIT is extended for up to 9 years.

Currently, \$125,500 is needed to fully fund the 44 scholarship grant applications. Please send in your donation by December 31 to the Lutheran SGO.

90 Years of Serving in our Community

Did you know that Calvary is celebrating its 90th anniversary in 2021? Borrowing text from Calvary's website (https://www.clcs.org/who-we-are/) I want to share:

In November 1929, a canvas was conducted on the southside of Indianapolis with the purpose of establishing a new mission church. Services were held throughout 1930 in a store building near Madison and Epler Avenues. On January 21, 1931 Calvary Evangelical Lutheran Church was officially organized. Services were conducted in a portable chapel, which was moved from Fort Wayne, Indiana and still stands, at 1531 East Epler Avenue.





Because of a growing ministry, land was purchased at Dudley and Shelby Street and a new church was dedicated at that site on March 15, 1942.





In the mid-1940s, Calvary arranged with St. Paul's congregation for the Christian Education of its children. In 1948, Calvary called its first teacher, Mr. August Schwark, who served at. St. Paul's school until Calvary built its own school with two new classrooms constructed in 1950. Every year Mr. Schwark "rung in the school year" with his brass teacher's bell. In 2009, his wife, Mabel, and his son, Jim, took over that tradition as Mr. August Schwark was called home in September, 2008.

The original purchase of land at 6111 Shelby Street included six acres. We now have 14 acres. In January, 1963 Calvary dedicated two new classrooms, a kitchen, dining area and worship center at our current location. That worship center now serves as our auditorium/gymnasium.





To accommodate an ever-expanding ministry Calvary added more space to its Christian Day School through building programs in 1985, 1990, and 1996 and began the new millennium with additional construction under a special Lilly Foundation matching grant. Calvary's current sanctuary has been expanded and remodeled from the 1982 building and was rededicated on Easter 1997.

Praise God for His calling, His provision and faithfulness to the people of Calvary!
