## *From the Pastors*

### **“Sent...with a Purpose” (2021-22 Ministry Year Theme)**

*“For I have come down from heaven, not to do my own will but the will of him who **sent** me.” (John 6:38).*

**As we look to the year ahead, we reflect upon the question, “What kind of church does Jesus want us to be?”**

#### **We are "Sent..." - Reflections from the Gospel of John**

**Sent with a purpose** (John 4:34; 5:30; 6:38; 9:4; 14:24)

**Sent with forgiveness** (John 20:21-23)

**Sent into the world** (John 17:15-18)

The word “sent” appears repeatedly within the Gospel of John—not only on the lips of the author, but on the lips of Jesus as well. It emphasizes the theme throughout the Gospel of the intentionality and purposefulness of Jesus’ ministry. The arrival of Jesus at this time and in this place was no mistake. It indeed was an act of grace. At just the right time, the Father sent his Son to fulfill the long-awaited hopes not just of Israel but of all humanity. As Jesus was sent into this world at the word and the will of the Father, so also were Jesus’ disciples sent into the world with purpose and intent. Jesus does this even to this day, sending us out with a purpose in mind. The question is, “Do we live within that purpose?” Many dream big dreams for themselves and thereby overlook the everyday opportunities that lie right in front of them because God must be calling them to something greater. Others, however, allow themselves to buy into a lie that they will never amount to much and thereby miss the exciting opportunities that God is calling them to. How do we gain both a God-sized vision and a Jesus-sized humility? Jesus did not send us to gain glory and attention for ourselves nor did he send us to let life pass us by as if we have nothing to offer. Too often we convince ourselves that pastors and missionaries and church workers are the only Christians who are sent with the purpose and intention of God. The truth, however, is that God has sent you with purpose into your own unique vocation and set of relationships and responsibilities. For it is within those day-to-day callings that he has sent you to do “BIG” things. Only you can love and serve your family and friends the way that you can. Only you can give yourself to your job or hobbies or volunteer opportunities in the way that you can. Too often we are searching and questioning and asking, “God, what do you want me to do with my life?” Sometimes the answers are much closer to home than you realize.

When I think about what it means for Jesus to have sent us into the world with a purpose, I can’t help but think of this old story that I heard many years ago:

*“When I was a young man, I wanted to change the world. I found it was difficult to change the world, so I tried to change my nation. When I found I couldn’t change the nation, I began to focus on my town. I couldn’t change the town and as an older man, I tried to change my family. Now, as an old man, I realize the only thing I can change is myself, and suddenly I realize that if long ago I had changed myself, I could have made an impact on my family. My family and I could have made an impact on our town. Their impact could have changed the nation and I could indeed have changed the world.”*

Thanks for being a part of the people of God here at Calvary! May God bless our efforts together as we serve the southside of Indianapolis.


### Young Adult Board Game Night

# Stewardship Emphasis

## **Stewardship Update** *By Jake Allen, Stewardship Ministry Team Director*

### **Calvary Endowment Funds Update – Church Endowment Funds**

This month the Stewardship Ministry is making the second of three reports on each of Calvary's three endowment funds: 1) The Church Endowment Fund; 2) The Schwark Endowment Fund; and 3) The Wessler Endowment Fund. Each of these funds serve a distinct purpose in our Ministry. This month we will discuss the status of the Schwark School Endowment Fund.

### **AUGUST C. SCHWARK ENDOWMENT AND ANNUAL FUND**

The market value of the Schwark Endowment fund is \$242,301 (as of August 31, 2021). Since its inception, this fund has disbursed over \$40,000 for scholarships. Each year the distribution from the Endowment Fund is added to the Annual Fund to provide scholarships to a Calvary family that would not otherwise be able to afford a Christian education in our School. We thank God for the generous gifts that provide more families with the opportunity to experience the blessings of a Christian education. Scholarship recipients are supported each school year.

To give to this fund using your offering envelope, mark "Schwark Annual Fund" or "Schwark Endowment Fund" on your envelope. Funds given to the Annual Fund may be used in full immediately for financial assistance of Calvary students. Alternatively, funds given to the Endowment Fund are for the long-term ministry of Calvary with a distribution of 5% each year for scholarships. You may contribute to this or any of the other endowment funds through a gift of cash or stock, naming the endowment in your will or as a beneficiary on your life insurance policy, pension plan (401k) or IRA. ### **Mission Update from El Salvador**

Calvary supports many mission initiatives through our giving. These projects include local outreach (Lutheran High School and the Hispanic Ministry for example) as well as international efforts (examples include Mission India and the El Salvador Mission).

With regard to recent updates from our El Salvador friends and partners, work continues on the new church in Citala. Calvary sponsorship helped Pastor Mejia and the Citala congregation complete the installation of the church flooring. The remaining two items of importance are the banos and windows. Calvary will be sponsoring the banos. Calvary is sending a small team in early November to assist in the banos construction. As part of this trip Calvary will also be participating in a medical mission. Rebeca Carow and Suresh Reddy will be assisting Dr. Rebecca in conducting a clinic at the church on Friday and Saturday. The small team will be carrying down school supplies for the kindergarten school in Citala and for the elementary school in Las Tunas. The Calvary team will visit each school early in the morning before starting work at the clinic and church. The team will hand out supplies, share a Bible story, and do a craft. ### **Reduce Your State Taxes – Consider a Gift to the Lutheran Scholarship Granting Organization (SGO)**

This is a reminder that gifts to the Scholarship Granting Organization may be eligible for a 50% credit on your Indiana State Income Taxes. There may be federal tax benefits as well. ### **Status of Calvary SGO giving year to date**

Thanks to everyone who has already made a gift to the SGO for the benefit of Calvary. As of early October, approximately \$55,000 has been donated to provide scholarship dollars to Calvary students. An additional \$69,000 is still needed to get to our SGO funds target by year end. Please be aware that the tax credits that the State of Indiana has set aside are limited and many other schools are also utilizing these funds. Therefore, it is important to consider making your gift sooner than later before the pool of available tax credits is all used up. For questions about SGO giving, please contact Jennifer Skojac.

# Calvary Lutheran School News from Principal Rensner

## Opening Doors

God has blessed families of Indiana with the choice of sending their children to the school that they feel best meets their needs. The LUTHERAN SGO of Indiana has changed the boundaries of the local school and greatly broadened them. You have the opportunity to open even more doors allowing students to enter the hallways of Calvary Lutheran Church and School. This opportunity will provide scholarship grants to students and their families. Contributions made by you for this purpose will be used to offer a Christian education so that children may not only receive a quality education, but to hear God's Word.

*How do I help open these doors?* Contribution forms for Lutheran SGO are available in the church and school offices or online at [www.LutheranSGO.org](http://www.LutheranSGO.org). The state of Indiana will give to you a tax credit of 50% of your donation. Example: If you give a gift of \$1000.00 you will receive an Indiana state tax credit of \$500.00. This is a unique opportunity. Funding for all of these scholarship grants for current students enrolled at Calvary is \$125,500.00. We have currently gathered approximately \$55,000.00. Those desiring to contribute to this fund may do so through December 31 to receive the tax credit for this 2021 calendar year. Even better still, students under a Scholarship Granting Organization are eligible for a CHOICE Indiana state voucher the following school year. Any additional funds gathered will remain in our account with the Lutheran SGO of Indiana to be used during the 2022-23 school year. We ask the Lord to provide for the needs of others through the gifts of our hands.

## Free Samples- Holiday Season Goodies

Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic stores would often freely distribute samples to patrons. The Taste of Sam's at Sam's Club and Costco's holiday blitz were suppliers of these free samples. There were often enough samples to have a catered lunch. So many items to sample during that holiday preview. The question is - Did the free sample entice you enough to actually purchase the advertised item?

Free samples consist of a small investment in hopes of obtaining a much larger return. After sampling the clerk would direct you to the product's location and cost. The true evaluation would be if the sample kept you wanting to come back for more and more and more.

We experience a sampling of life each day. We take a bite, taste it and see.

- That new job excites me. I use my gifts more fully and I can't wait for another day to work there.
- A young child samples skateboarding and I really likes it asking for more pads and equipment.
- The music student tried the trombone, but preferred the baritone.
- In this world we only receive a sampling of God's presence and love. In our sinful condition we are not able to come to our Holy God and live. Yet, even that sampling of love that we receive each day sent His One and Only Son to suffer and die for our sins. That sampling now assures us of Eternal Life. The full glory of God will be revealed to us when we stand in His presence. God indeed freely shares His love with us each day. There is ABSOLUTELY NOTHING for us to buy. Our prayer is that as we receive His love, we thirst and seek more and more. This is accomplished through the gift of His Spirit, the Sacraments, His Word, and prayer. We are privileged to share God's love each day with the students, staff, and families of CLCS. We ask that this sampling in turn grows in our hearts multiplying this love to others.

Sometimes the stores would run out of samples. The Good News is that God's love never runs out. He shares that love with us each day as we See the Good.

And many might agree a garden-fresh tomato, ripe and juicy, is an epitome of summer. And goodness. Bonus. Mark delivered the produce to our distribution site. # Women in Mission

## Comfort Care Quilting

For many people, quilts are synonymous with comfort. They may serve as a reminder of a parent or grandparent who gave them one as a child. Or perhaps, they simply are a colorful source of warmth. Sometimes, that warmth and colors are exactly what's needed in the sterile white of a hospital room.

Stitching together layers of fabric embedded with compassion does much more than bring physical comfort to patients at IU Health adult academic health center. The Mental Health Counseling quilting program provides hand-sewn quilts to patients who have transitioned to comfort care at IU Health Methodist Hospital, to also serve as an heirloom for the families to remember their loved ones after they have passed away.


One of the major supporters of the MHC quilting program is the Calvary Quilters. This group has had a long-standing history with volunteer work in healthcare. Originally, the Calvary Quilters partnered with the White Cross Guild—a Methodist Hospital volunteer group—to volunteer at the hospital by wrapping bandages during World War II. From there, the group decided to do additional volunteer work and begin working at their church as off-site volunteers. For the past 35 plus years, they have made puppy pillows for pediatric patients, lung pillows for lung transplant patients, and comfort quilts for trauma patients.

Judy Kirkland, a long-term member of the organization says, "We just hope it brings comfort and that the families can appreciate it."

Together, the groups have been able to make over 250 quilts and give about 20 quilts per month to patients. After the quilts are made, care teams and chaplains handpick each quilt to match the patient.

Susie Christian-Hodgson, IU Health adult academic health center patient and visitor services project coordinator, works closely with the quilting group and has personally experienced the impact of a compassion quilt. She lost a loved one to cancer, and the staff at the hospital her relative stayed at in Florida gave her a quilt they made. She expressed that she was able to find comfort in receiving the quilt, and this is an item that she, like many families, cherish.

Renetta Sargent shares why she is a member of Calvary's Quilters. "The way I look at it it's a win-win situation. I have the privilege of working with my hands which I thoroughly enjoy, alongside of some of the master quilters on the south side, while developing new brain cells as I try to figure out some challenging quilt patterns. It's truly a blessing that Jesus has given to me. I mostly enjoy making baby quilts. Calvary quilters has a tremendous ministry of making quilts for hospitals and patients.
