What good is dead faith?

James 2:14-26

14 What good is it, my brothers, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? Can that faith save him?

What good is dead faith?

¹⁴ What good is it, my brothers, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? Can that faith save him? ¹⁵ If a brother or sister is poorly clothed and lacking in daily food, ¹⁶ and one of you says to them, "Go in peace, be warmed and filled," without giving them the things needed for the body, what good is that? ¹⁷ So also faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead.

"What good is it..." Note: James is talking about usefulness!

Do we expect our faith to be useful, offering tangible benefits to ourselves and others?

James does!

"15 If a brother or sister is poorly clothed and lacking in daily food, 16 and one of you says to them, "Go in peace, be warmed and filled," without giving them the things needed for the body, what good is that?"

"20 Do you want to be shown, you foolish person, that faith apart from works is useless?"

James 2:14-26

¹⁸ But someone will say, "You have faith and I have works."

Or "You have works and I have faith!"

Faith and works are inseparable.

James 2:14-26

¹⁸ But someone will say, "You have faith and I have works." Show me your faith apart from your works, and I will show you my faith by my works.

Even the demons believe...

James 2:14-26

¹⁸ But someone will say, "You have faith and I have works." Show me your faith apart from your works, and I will show you my faith by my works. ¹⁹ You believe that God is one; you do well. Even the demons believe—and shudder!

James 2:14-26

Works, works, works James 2:14-26

²⁰ Do you want to be shown, you foolish person, that faith apart from works is useless? ²¹ Was not Abraham our father justified by works when he offered up his son Isaac on the altar? ²² You see that faith was **working together** with his works, and faith was completed by his works;

Works "complete" faith

James 2:14-26

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What do we mean by "faith was completed by his works?"

The word "completed" can mean a couple different things:

- Perfected
- Finished
- Accomplished

What do we mean by "faith was completed by his works?"

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So either the faith is **lacking** something apart from works or it only truly **exists** alongside works.

"...that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing." (James 1:4)

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"Counted to him as righteousness" James 2:14–26

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Justified by works

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Dead.

²⁵ And in the same way was not also Rahab the prostitute justified by works when she received the messengers and sent them out by another way? ²⁶ For as the body apart from the spirit is dead, so also faith apart from works is dead.

Why Abraham and Rahab?

- These two are also highlighted in Hebrews 11, where they are both examples of faith!
- James points out Abraham offering his son and Rahab's reception and assistance of the messengers.
 - "[Abraham] believed the LORD, and he counted it to him as righteousness" (Gen. 15:6)... long before Abraham's sacrifice of Isaac.
 - Rahab was a prostitute... and a Gentile. Yet she is a paragon of faith and works in James, just like Abraham.

What does it mean for someone to be justified by works?

- Note something James does not say: "Abraham justified himself..." or "Rahab justified herself..."
- Abraham and Rahab were justified by works.
- Hebrews 11 makes a similar statement: "1 Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. 2 For by it the people of old received their commendation."

Justified by works? Or Faith?

Romans 4:1-3

¹ What then shall we say was gained by Abraham, our forefather according to the flesh? ² For if Abraham was justified by works, he has something to boast about, but not before God. ³ For what does the Scripture say? "Abraham believed God, and it was counted to him as righteousness."

Not a result of works

Ephesians 2:8-10

⁸ For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, ⁹ not a result of works, so that no one may boast. ¹⁰ For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them.

Righteousness, Justification, Salvation

- Righteousness ≈ Justification
- Justification ≠ Salvation
- 2 Kinds of Righteousness
 - Righteousness before God
 - Righteousness before men

James vs. Paul Righteousness before God & Men

"21 Was not Abraham our father justified by works when he offered up his son Isaac on the altar?" (James 2)

- James is talking about the second kind of righteousness and usefulness.
- "² For if Abraham was justified by works, he has something to boast about, but not before God." (Rom. 4)
 - Paul is talking about the first kind of righteousness and merit.
- "8 For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, 9 not a result of works, so that no one may boast." (Eph. 2)
 - Here, Paul is talking about the first kind of righteousness and salvation.
