... And James' Solution.

- Humility and Submission
- Do not Judge.
- "If the Lord wills..."
- Be fair, generous, & just.
- Be patient & establish your hearts.
- Let your "yes" be yes and your "no" be no.

³⁸ "You have heard that it was said, 'An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.' ³⁹ But I say to you, Do not resist the one who is evil. But if anyone slaps you on the right cheek, turn to him the other also. ⁴⁰ And if anyone would sue you and take your tunic, let him have your cloak as well. ⁴¹ And if anyone forces you to go one mile, go with him two miles. ⁴² Give to the one who begs from you, and do not refuse the one who would borrow from you.
