PENTECOST


The Lutheran Theological Seminary Ghana is located in the village of Saasabi, which is about 30 kilometers north-northeast of Accra. Our missionary house is located in the southeast corner of the seminary compound. We have been blessed for the past almost six years to know Patrick Sarfo. He lives in the boy's quarters on our compound and serves as our night guard and driver.

Patrick's passion in life is to mentor teenage boys, especially the "street boys." He wants to reach them with the love of Jesus and show them that people do care about them. Many boys leave home at a young age because their families can no longer provide support. When these boys are no longer attending school they are prone to join together and turn to illegal activities to be able to buy food and needed items. This is when Patrick steps in and helps to provide for them and give them a purpose for living.

In the above photo, 20 of the boys joined for an afternoon of spiritual mentoring, food, and fun. These boys come often to visit Patrick and we have come to know many of them and offer spiritual guidance.

Through various "connections" Patrick assists as many of the boys as possible in finding work that will, hopefully, become a career for them. One young man is an apprentice to an auto mechanic in Dodowa and is quickly learning a much needed trade that will provide for him to support himself. Another is in a technical high school learning to be an electrician while two others are now apprentices to a seasoned electrician.

We are comforted to know even in the absence of the seminary students, my wife, and I; that Patrick will continue to be in the village to be a mentor to these young men while also reaching out with the Gospel.

Update for Ghana & the Seminary

The seminary compound has a new "caretaker." Nathaniel, his wife Bless, and daughter, Josephine, have moved into the boy's quarters of the West Missionary House. Nathaniel has developed a small "farm" or vegetable garden. In America we would call him a master gardener. He assists in taking care of the seminary grounds and his garden will provide some vegetables for his small family and the seminary. Nathaniel desires to attend the seminary with the next incoming class, and his wife, Bless, will serve as the seminary cook.

While Nathaniel and Patrick take care of the seminary compound, the CoVid-19 virus continues to spread. On May 31, Ghana confirmed over 10,000 CoVid-19 cases, resulting in President



Akufo-Addo extending the closure of Ghana's borders (land, air, and sea) to human traffic until further notice. All schools are closed, but in July the students who are in their last term of studies, for their class level, will be able to attend classes with restrictions to complete their course of studies and take their final exams.

Stage one, of the reopening plan, has begun which allows churches to begin services with these restrictions: churches must be disinfected and fumigated; an abridged format of services can commence with a maximum duration of one hour: 25% attendance with a maximum of 100; mandatory wearing of masks; hand washing and sanitizers provided; must provide toilets (with regular cleaning); no hugging, hand shaking or spitting; no group singing, dancing, or waving of handkerchiefs; and separate sitting for those who are "fairly old."
